Opening day. 500 people marched led by Brierfield brass band. Mr and Mrs Philip Snowden opened the building. Around 600 people came to celebrate.

Nelson ILP was the second largest in the country with 700 men and women wanting to achieve representation for working people, and to get workers rights. The Socialist Institute they created is still standing.

"Let there be Peace" Women's Peace Crusade spreads like wildfire across

the country . Selina Cooper and Gertrude Ingham lead 2000 women through Nelson protesting against the war. "A large contingent of girls following were attired in white and wore wreaths of smilax, with green shoulder sashes bearing the word Peace".

They continued to campaign against war throughout the 1920s and 1930s.




